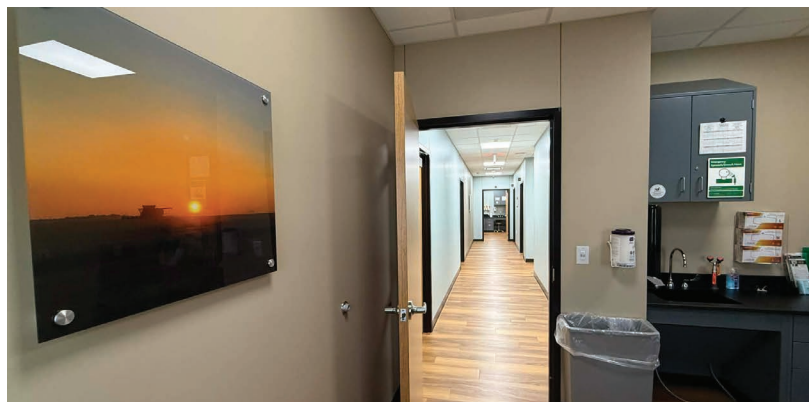

Memorial Hospital is excited to announce that Convenient Care will open in its new location on February 9, 2026, inside the Medical Office Building addition alongside the Chester Clinic. While Convenient Care has long been a trusted service for our community, this move brings a fresh, more comfortable space and greater convenience for patients.

For years, Convenient Care operated within the Emergency Department. Relocating the clinic gives patients a calmer, more efficient experience, without the need to wait alongside emergency patients who must take priority.

Why Choose Convenient Care?

Convenient Care is designed to meet the needs of busy families and individuals who want timely, affordable care for minor illnesses and injuries. Many patients find it to be a great care option because:

- **It's more affordable.** Convenient Care visits are billed at a lower rate than Emergency Department visits.
- **Insurance denials are less likely.** ER claims can be denied if the visit is deemed "non-emergent," leaving patients responsible for the bill.
- **You're seen quickly.** Convenient Care is ideal for minor issues that don't require emergency treatment.
- **Saturday hours add flexibility.** Care is available even on weekends.
- **It keeps your care close to home.** With access to lab work, imaging, and follow-up care right next door at Memorial Hospital, patients benefit from seamless, local support.
- **It supports continuity of care.** Providers can easily coordinate with your primary care team, ensuring your health history stays connected and up-to-date.
- **It offers a more comfortable experience.** The new clinic features larger, private exam rooms and a spacious waiting area designed with patient comfort in mind.

How the Walk-In Clinic Works

Memorial Hospital's Walk-In Clinic is open Monday through Saturday, and no appointment is needed.

- Upon arrival, a clinical assistant will complete an initial assessment.
- Based on your symptoms, the clinical assistant or medical provider will determine whether Convenient Care is the right setting for your needs.
- If your condition qualifies, you'll be seen at the Convenient Care rate. If a higher level of care is needed, you'll be directed to the Emergency Department. Any lab work, imaging, or medications will be billed separately — and all are conveniently located just steps away.
- To keep Convenient Care affordable, patients are asked to pay their Convenient Care co-pay at the time of service.

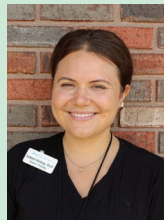

From First Words to Recovery: Full-Spectrum Speech Therapy Services



Clear communication and safe swallowing are essential parts of everyday life. At Memorial Hospital's Therapy & Sports Rehab Center in Chester, Speech-Language Pathologist Isabel Carron, M.S., CCC-SLP, provides personalized care to help children, adults and seniors strengthen their speech, language, voice and swallowing skills.

Helping Children Find Their Voice

Isabel supports children with speech and language delays, articulation challenges and childhood apraxia of speech. Her sessions include motor-planning exercises, play-based learning and family coaching to build confidence and communication skills. She also provides articulation therapy for sound production.

Fluency, Clarity and Confidence for All Ages

For children and adults who stutter or clutter, Isabel offers fluency-shaping techniques, stuttering modification and strategies to improve speech rate and clarity.

Voice Therapy and Vocal Wellness

Individuals with voice disorders, such as dysphonia or muscle tension dysphonia, receive targeted treatment, vocal hygiene education and techniques to reduce strain and improve vocal quality.

Support After Stroke or Brain Injury

Isabel helps stroke and brain injury survivors rebuild communication and thinking skills through vocabulary practice, narrative skills, memory strategies, and problem-solving exercises.

Swallowing and Age-Related Communication Needs

For older adults with dysphagia, Isabel provides swallowing evaluations, diet recommendations and exercises to strengthen the muscles involved in safe eating and drinking.

Autism, Social Communication and AAC

Isabel works with individuals on the autism spectrum to build social communication skills and supports nonverbal clients through augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) devices.

Partnering With Families Early

Early intervention makes a powerful difference. Isabel guides families through developmental language delays and home strategies that encourage communication growth.

Memorial Hospital is alerting our community to an increase in phone scams that appear to come from local phone numbers. These calls are designed to trick individuals into sharing personal or financial information. While these calls may look legitimate, they are not from the listed number.

What to Watch For

Phone scams often include the following warning signs:

- The caller asks for personal information such as your Social Security number, passwords, or bank information.
- The caller pressures you to act quickly or claims there is an urgent problem.
- The caller refuses to let you hang up or insists you stay on the line.
- The caller's tone or message feels unusual, unexpected, or "off."
- You are not expecting a call from that number.

If something doesn't feel right, trust your instincts.

How to Handle a Suspicious Call

- Do not share your personal information if you feel it is a scam call.
- Hang up immediately.
- Call the listed person/business directly using the number listed on their website or your billing statement to confirm whether the call was legitimate.
- Report the call to the business so they can track ongoing activity.

Reporting suspicious calls helps protect the entire community.

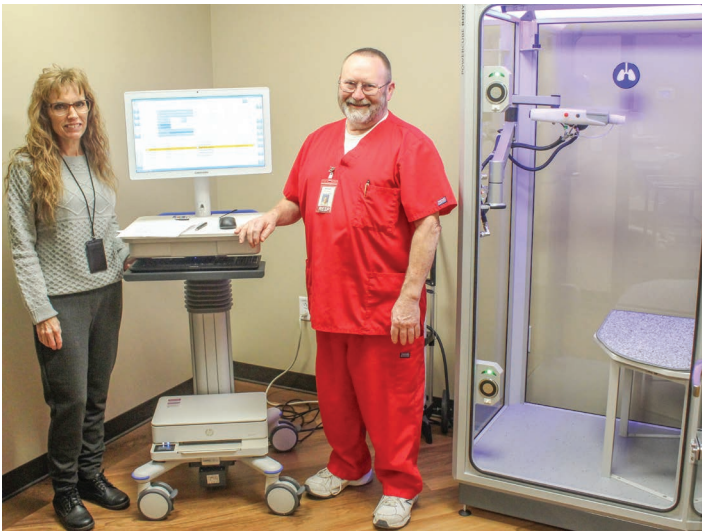
If You Have Already Shared Personal Information

If you believe you may have given out personal details during one of these calls, there are steps you can take right away to protect yourself:

- Consider enrolling in an identity protection or credit monitoring service.
- Monitor your bank accounts, credit cards, and insurance statements for unusual activity.
- Contact your financial institution if you shared banking information.
- Review your credit reports for any unfamiliar accounts or inquiries.

Taking action quickly can help reduce the risk of identity theft.

Cardiopulmonary Receives New Pulmonary Function Testing Machine

Memorial Hospital is proud to announce the installation of a new PowerCube+ Series Pulmonary Function Testing (PFT) machine, manufactured by Ganshorn, in the Cardiopulmonary Department. Installed on January 27, this state-of-the-art system replaces equipment that has served the community for more than 25 years; bringing a new level of precision, comfort, and diagnostic capability to patients.

PFTs are a group of noninvasive breathing tests that measure how well the lungs are working. They play a vital role in diagnosing and monitoring conditions such as asthma, COPD, emphysema, and other respiratory diseases, as well as helping providers evaluate how well

treatments or medications are working. At Memorial Hospital, all PFT results are over-read by Dr. Spence, Pulmonologist, ensuring expert interpretation and continuity of care.

The new PowerCube+ system uses ultrasonic technology, which allows for exceptionally precise measurement of lung volumes, airflow, and gas exchange. This level of accuracy supports earlier detection of respiratory issues and more tailored treatment plans. This is an important advantage for patients managing chronic lung conditions.

For patients, this means:

- More accurate results, leading to clearer diagnoses
- Better monitoring of disease progression and treatment effectiveness
- A smoother, more comfortable testing experience

For clinicians and staff, the system's user-friendly design streamlines the testing process, reduces setup time, and enhances workflow. Georgia Stipe, Director of Cardiopulmonary, noted that the installation was quick and the team has found the system intuitive and efficient to use.

By investing in this advanced technology, Memorial Hospital continues its commitment to offering high-quality specialty services close to home. This is an important benefit for individuals with chronic breathing issues who may already face mobility or fatigue challenges. With enhanced diagnostic capabilities and improved patient experience, the Cardiopulmonary Department is better equipped than ever to support the long-term lung health of our community.

Memorial Hospital is pleased to share a mid year update on the 2025–2026 Medical Explorers Program, now in its seventh year of inspiring local students to explore careers in healthcare. Since its launch, the program has welcomed more than 140 students, with 42% choosing to participate for two to three years, demonstrating strong interest and continued engagement. Open to students from their freshman year of high school through age 20, the program has historically included participants from Chester, Trico, Steeleville, Sparta, Gibault, Red Bud, Southwestern Illinois College, and home school programs.

The program provides hands on learning, department tours, and direct interaction with healthcare professionals who are passionate about mentoring the next generation. This year's cohort includes 34 students from six area high schools, representing grades 9–12. From Chester High School, participants include Morgan Absher, Taylor Absher, Allie Bainter, Aaliyah Berkbuegler, Logan Brace, Abby Carter, Kaylee Cowell, Hadlie Cushman, Jaimy Duran, Brenna Hammel, Emily Melching, Isabela Rafael, Kaylee Rogers, Rylee Shemonic, Kenna Thompson, and Camryn Wolff. Steeleville High School students include Emma Batson, Hillari Cowan, Karlie Kranz, Kamryn Patterson, Lexi Smith, Ella Tripp, and Karsen Wedemeyer. From Gibault High School, participants are Eli Congiardo, Kaila Jerkatis, and Amelia Meyer. Red Bud High School is represented by Ava Deterding, Claire Deterding, Katie Deterding, Megan Moeller, Alayna Schmoll, and Kylie Zipfel. Trico High School is represented by Aaron Steenson, and Coulterville High School by Maribeth Strate.

Throughout this program year, participants have the opportunity to engage with professionals from Memorial Hospital's Cardiac Pulmonary Rehab Center, Rural Health Clinics, Memorial Community Pharmacy, OR, MSU and ER Nursing, Anesthesia, and Diagnostic

Imaging Departments. The program welcomes the following outside health and wellness organizations Rheinecker Chiropractic, ComWell, Chester Family Dental, MedStar Ambulance, Southern Illinois Eyecare, AirEvac, and Area Health Education Centers (AHEC). These sessions allow students to observe real world medical environments, ask questions, and gain insight into the skills and dedication required in healthcare careers.

Benefits of the program include hands on demonstrations, observation of clinical procedures, and learning directly from providers across multiple specialties. The program also emphasizes career exploration through job shadowing, giving students the chance to discuss educational pathways, job responsibilities, and the realities of working in rural healthcare. Students in their Senior year of high school or enrolled in a college or university can apply for a Medical Explorer Scholarship offered by the Memorial Hospital Auxiliary.

As part of the program's long term impact, Memorial Hospital has proudly hired 12 former Explorers or 8% of all past participants, with additional students serving as interns and completing a clinical rotations. Alumni have gone on to pursue a wide range of healthcare and service oriented careers, including Occupational Therapy, Social Work, Speech Language Pathology, Nursing, Health Administration, Labor and Delivery Nursing, Pharmaceuticals, Physician Assistant studies, Surgery, and various military career paths.

Memorial Hospital remains committed to supporting the health and vitality of the region by investing in future healthcare professionals. Programs like Medical Explorers help strengthen the local workforce pipeline and inspire students to consider meaningful careers in medicine, allied health, and community wellness right here in the places they call home.

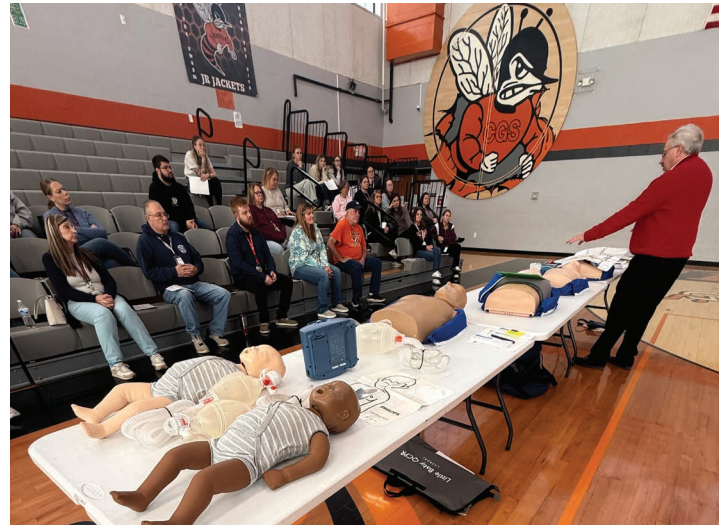

Memorial Hospital hosted Nursing Skills Days from December 2–4, 2025, bringing together RNs, LPNs, and CNAs from across the ER, ICU, MSU, Infusion, and OR for three days of immersive, hands-on training. Held in the hospital's conference room and key clinical departments, the event reinforced Memorial's commitment to clinical excellence, emergency readiness, and the highest standards of patient care.

The Skills Days featured a robust lineup of competency-based stations designed to refresh and validate critical nursing procedures. From high-acuity interventions like chest tube management, AutoPulse operation, intraosseous (IO) insertion, and central line/PICC/Midline/Port-A-Cath care, to essential safety practices such as N95 fit testing, PPE protocols, and restraint/seclusion procedures, the event ensured staff were prepared for any situation.

Additional training included:

- EKG interpretation, high-flow

- oxygen therapy, and Airvo systems
- Malignant hyperthermia response
- IV pump operation (primary, secondary, bolus)
- Blood administration
- Pharmacy compounding and Stericycle protocols
- Adult Foley catheter insertion
- Safe patient handling with slide boards, box lifts, gait belts, Hoyer/SLIPP, and the Med Sled
- Professional development and interdepartmental collaboration

"Skills Day 2025 brought together all nursing staff for three days of hands-on learning and competency validation," said Kelly Jany, Chief Nursing Officer. "With so many high-value stations offered, it was hard to choose just one highlight, but my favorite part of the experience was witnessing the staff practice and refresh critical skills in a hands-on environment. The balance of critical-care procedures, safety training, and

professional development made the experience not only educational but energizing for the entire nursing team."

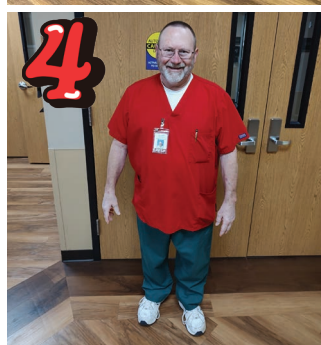
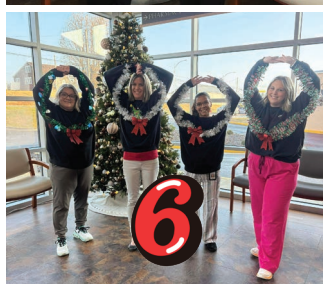
across the community we serve.

Emergency Preparedness Drill Conducted to Strengthen Readiness

Memorial Hospital successfully conducted a full-scale emergency preparedness drill on December 18, bringing together staff from across the organization, including participants from the Chester Rural Health Clinic, for a comprehensive training scenario designed to enhance readiness for real-world emergencies.

The simulated event centered on a multi-vehicle accident involving a 12-passenger van of students, creating a complex and fast-moving situation that required coordinated triage, treatment, communication, and family reunification efforts. Staff practiced critical skills including 2-way radio communication, first aid, patient tracking, and emergency room care. New employees also had the opportunity to take part in incident command operations, gaining hands-on experience in leadership roles during high-pressure situations.

A key component of the drill focused on family reunification. Volunteers portraying parents and a spouse arrived at the hospital seeking loved ones, allowing staff to practice compassionate communication, verification procedures, and reunification protocols. The exercise reinforced the importance of both clinical and emotional support during crisis events.

Georgia Stipe, Emergency Preparedness Director at Memorial Hospital, facilitated the drill and praised the team's perfor-

mance. "These exercises are essential for ensuring our staff are confident, coordinated, and ready for anything," Stipe said. "Every drill teaches us something new, and I'm incredibly proud of how our team worked together. Their dedication to preparedness directly strengthens the safety of our patients and our community."

Hospital leadership noted that the drill ran smoothly, with staff demonstrating strong teamwork and adaptability. Lessons learned will be incorporated into future training sessions as Memorial Hospital continues its commitment to continuous improvement and emergency readiness.

Full-scale drills like this one play a vital role in preparing healthcare teams for real emergencies, ensuring that when seconds matter, staff are equipped with the skills, communication tools, and confidence needed to respond effectively.
