Early detection is the single most powerful advantage in the fight against breast cancer. In 2025, an estimated

316,950 women and 2,800 men in the United States will be diagnosed with invasive breast cancer, and when the disease is found at a localized stage the five-year relative survival rate is about 99 percent. Because screening can find changes before symptoms appear, many experts support the option to begin annual mammography at age 40 after discussing personal risk with a healthcare provider. Men can and do get breast cancer as well, so anyone who notices unusual breast changes should speak with their clinician promptly. At Memorial Hospital, that first step, an order from your physician and a scheduled mammogram, is the beginning of a care pathway designed to move quickly, gently, and effectively from screening to treatment when needed.

intimately. What began as a
routine mammogram became
the moment that altered her
life and set her on a path from
shock to action. "I walked in for
something I thought was routine,
and suddenly my life changed," she
remembers. "Finding it early gave me the
power to fight. I wasn't facing the unknown alone, I had a plan, and
people who believed in me." Those words hold the complex mixture
of fear and relief that many patients feel when facing a diagnosis.

The mammography experience at Memorial is built to be clear, respectful, and efficient. The hospital uses 3D mammography, capturing multiple images of the breast to improve diagnostic accuracy and reduce unnecessary callbacks.

Early detection provides them a gift though: time and options.

Your Immunization Guide: Vaccines, Who Needs Them, When, & How Often

Keeping up with recommended vaccines is one of the simplest, most effective ways to protect yourself, your family, and your community. Memorial Hospital Rural Health Clinics offer a full range of routine and age-based immunizations for infants, children, adolescents, adults, and older adults. Below is a clear guide to the vaccines we provide, who should get them, and what diseases they prevent.

CHILDHOOD PRIMARY SERIES

HEPATITIS B (HEPB)

What it protects against:

Hepatitis B virus, which can cause acute and chronic liver disease, cirrhosis, and liver cancer.

Who should receive it:

All newborns beginning at birth, unvaccinated children, and adults at increased risk such as healthcare workers and people with diabetes.

Schedule: Typically a 3-dose series over six months.

HAEMOPHILUS INFLUENZAE TYPE B (HIB)

What it protects against:

Invasive Hib disease including meningitis, epiglottitis, and severe pneumonia.

Who should receive it:

Infants according to the routine schedule (2, 4, [6], and 12–15 months depending on the vaccine brand).

Schedule: 3- or 4-dose series depending on product.

DTAP AND TDAP/TD

What it protects against:

Diphtheria, tetanus (lockjaw), and pertussis (whooping cough).

Who should receive it:

DTaP for infants and children; Tdap recommended for adolescents, adults who have not previously received Tdap, and pregnant people during each pregnancy. Td boosters every 10

Schedule: DTaP series; single Tdap then Td boosters as needed.

POLIO (IPV)

What it protects against:

Poliovirus, which can cause paralysis and respiratory failure.

Who should receive it:

Children at routine intervals; certain adults traveling to areas with poliovirus risk.

Schedule: Four doses by school entry.

MMR AND VARICELLA

What they protect against:

Measles, mumps, rubella, and chickenpox.

Who should receive them:

Routine childhood series with two doses; susceptible teens and adults without immunity.

Schedule: Two doses for lifetime protection.

PNEUMOCOCCAL CONJUGATE FOR CHILDREN

What it protects against:

Pneumococcal disease including pneumonia, meningitis, and bloodstream infections.

Who should receive it:

Infants on schedule and children with certain high-risk conditions. **Schedule:** Series in infancy with boosters as indicated.

ADOLESCENT AND ADULT VACCINES

HPV (HUMAN PAPILLOMAVIRUS) What it protects against:

HPV types linked to cervical, throat, anal cancers and genital warts.

Who should receive it:

Routine at 11–12 years with catch-up through age 26; select adults 27–45 after shared decision-making.

Schedule:

2 doses if started before 15; 3 doses if started at 15 or older.

INFLUENZA (FLU)

What it protects against:

Seasonal influenza A and B viruses that cause respiratory illness and can lead to hospitalization.

Who should receive it:

Everyone 6 months and older annually.

Schedule:

Once every year, ideally before flu season peaks.

SHINGLES (SHINGRIX)

What it protects against:

Herpes zoster and postherpetic neuralgia.

Who should receive it:

Adults 50 and older.

Schedule:

Two doses, 2-6 months apart.

PNEUMOCOCCAL VACCINES FOR ADULTS

What they protect against:

Pneumococcal pneumonia and invasive disease.

Who should receive them:

Adults 65+ and younger adults with certain chronic conditions; consult your provider for the appropriate product and timing.

RSV VACCINE

What it protects against:

Severe respiratory syncytial virus illness.

Who should receive it:

Older adults and those with chronic cardiopulmonary conditions as recommended by current guidance.

Schedule:

Typically a single dose per season when recommended.

We were proud to welcome Robin Pratt to Memorial Hospital's Therapy & Sports Rehab Center in September as an Occupational Therapist and Certified Hand Therapist. She brings focused expertise in hand, wrist, and upper-extremity care and sees patients on Wednesdays. She adds a highly specialized skill set to the team through advanced certifications and a patient-centered approach to restoring function and reducing pain.

Robin earned her Certified Hand Therapist credential in 2018 and is also a Certified Ergonomic Assessment Specialist. She has concentrated her practice on orthopedic hand conditions and complex upper-extremity diagnoses, combining manual therapy, evidence-based modalities, and custom orthopedic devices to help patients recover strength, dexterity, and independence. She values continuous learning and professional growth, and she cites earning her Hand Therapist Certification as her proudest accomplishment. She is one of 7,322 word wide according to HTCC.



Robin's clinical scope includes a broad range of hand and upper-extremity conditions:

- Nerve compression syndromes such as carpal tunnel, cubital tunnel, and radial tunnel.
- Fractures and post-surgical rehabilitation for the hand, wrist, and arm.
- **Tendon injuries and transfers** and complex post-operative tendon reconstruction.
- Arthritis management and arthroplasty care, including CMC (base of thumb) arthroplasty and other joint replacement rehabilitation.
- Tendonitis presentations including lateral epicondylitis (tennis elbow), medial epicondylitis (golfer's elbow), and De Quervain's tenosynovitis.

 Amputation care and adaptive fabrication to restore function and support vocational needs.

- Custom splinting and orthotic fabrication tailored to protect healing structures, position joints for function, or enhance participation in daily activities.

Robin couples precise assessment with individualized treatment plans to address pain, range-of-motion limitations, weakness, scar management, and functional deficits. Her practice emphasizes measurable goals that align with each patient's daily demands and life roles.

Robin provides ergonomics services that help local workers stay safe and productive.

Her offerings include:

- **Functional capacity evaluations** to objectively measure a patient's ability to perform work tasks.
- Job function development testing and implementation, designing task-specific assessments that translate directly to workplace requirements.
- Body mechanics training and injury prevention programs that reduce the risk of re-injury and help employers meet occupational safety goals.

These services support both injured workers returning to duty and employers seeking proactive strategies to maintain a healthy workforce.

Robin's greatest reward is helping patients return to the activities they love; she finds deep satisfaction in guiding them from pain to independence.


"I am passionate about my patients' care, their progress, and seeing them achieve their goals,"

she says. Combining technical skill with creative problem-solving, she has fabricated finger extensions from splinting material for a patient with amputations so he could type and resume his job. She embraces evolving techniques to relieve stubborn pain: "I have learned some new techniques to even get patients out of pain and back to function especially with lateral epicondylitis."

Robin appreciates Memorial's collaborative culture and the small-town atmosphere: "It is a great atmosphere to work in. Everyone is so willing to help out." She finds the friendly environment supports both patient care and interdisciplinary teamwork. Though new to the team, she values the clinical variety she encounters and the challenge that comes with managing diverse diagnoses.

Robin's specialized skills offer practical benefits to patients across ages and occupations: faster, safer recovery after hand surgery or injury, targeted strategies to manage chronic tendon and nerve conditions, customized splints that restore function, and workplace evaluations that support safe return-to-work transitions. Her combined expertise in hand therapy and ergonomics positions her to address both the clinical and vocational aspects of recovery.

New Providers Joining the Memorial Hospital Specialty Clinic Team




Heather Cheaney, APRN, FNP-BC

Whether you need chemotherapy, immunotherapy, blood transfusions, port-a-cath or PICC line care, long-term antibiotic therapy, or injections and infusions for a range of medical needs, our fully equipped center provides thoughtful, personalized care designed to make each visit as comfortable and reassuring as possible.

From the moment you arrive, our Certified

Nursing Staff focuses on your comfort and safety. Treatment chairs are heated and massaging, each station has a personal TV and free Wi Fi, and our team moves with efficiency, so you spend less time commuting and more time resting with loved ones. The team coordinates closely with family physicians, labs, imaging, and specialty providers so appointments, results, and follow-ups happen smoothly.

Memorial's Specialty Clinic providers work hand in hand with the Infusion Center

to deliver coordinated care close to home. Dr. Justin Floyd, D.O., leads with both skill and heart. "Helping patients and families daily navigate the cancer journey reminds me why this work matters," he says. "Catching cancer early typically improves outcomes, and we're here to listen, answer questions, and build a plan that fits your life." Michelle McQuillan, DNP, FNP-BC, sees patients alongside Dr. Floyd to support symptom management, education, and continuity of care.

Through Dr. Floyd and the team at Cancer Care Specialists of Illinois, patients are offered access to clinical trials. Memorial Hospital also offers nutrition counseling, social work support, and rehabilitation services so care addresses the whole person, not just the diagnosis. Affiliations with regional centers strengthen the care available locally and help chart a path for expanded services in the future.

These practical tips make the mammogram easier:

- Schedule a few days after your period if possible
- · Wear a two-piece outfit
- Avoid deodorants or powders on exam day
- Bring any prior imaging or relevant health history

During the screening a technologist positions you between the machine's plates while compression spreads tissue for clearer images; each view takes only seconds, and most appointments run 15–30 minutes. If an area of concern appears, the team coordinates follow-up imaging or consultation promptly so patients aren't left waiting in uncertainty.

For Susan, that coordinated response mattered more than she could have known. A flagged scan was followed by fast, compassionate communication and clear next steps.

"They answered my questions, held my hand through the next steps, and made sure I understood what was happening,"

she says. That human connection changed the experience of diagnosis into the first step of a plan. It's the difference between feeling adrift and feeling supported.

When treatment became necessary, Susan found steady guidance in Memorial's Surgical Department and Oncology Specialty Clinic and Chemotherapy & Infusion Center. Dr. Justin Floyd, Oncologist, and a multidisciplinary team, care focused on evidence-based therapies balanced with attention to Susan's daily life and responsibilities. "Helping patients and families daily navigate the cancer journey reminds me why this work matters," Dr. Floyd says. "Catching cancer early typically improves outcomes, our job is to listen, answer questions, and build a plan that fits each person's life." That team-based approach means labs, imaging, primary care, and specialty providers collaborate closely to create individualized plans without unnecessary delay.

Memorial's Infusion Center delivers a broad spectrum of services to support patients through treatment and recovery: chemotherapy and immunotherapy, blood transfusions, port-a-cath and PICC line care and maintenance, long-term antibiotic therapy, and injections or infusions for a variety of medical needs. Certified nursing staff provide symptom management, education, and compassionate bedside care in a soothing environment. Patients also have access to clinical trials through Dr. Floyd, nutrition counseling, social work support, and rehabilitation services so treatment addresses the whole person, not just the disease.

Equally important to the clinical services is the emotional landscape of care. A cancer diagnosis touches identity, family roles, work, and daily routines, and the quiet supports offered by Memorial matter in ways statistics cannot measure. Susan describes the relief of finding trust within her care team: "Knowing there were people who believed in me, even on the hard days, gave me strength to keep moving forward." Small acts of kindness, clear explanations, and the willingness to sit with difficult questions create spaces where hope can take root even amid uncertainty.

Access to local, high-quality care was central to Susan's recovery. Fewer long drives meant less fatigue and more time at home with family. Memorial's affiliations with regional centers and its collaboration with surrounding hospitals ensure patients can receive coordinated oncology and surgical services nearby, preserving energy for healing rather than travel.

Susan's advice is both practical and heartfelt: "Don't put it off. Get your mammogram. It could be the thing that gives you more time, more options, and the chance to keep living the life you love." Her story reminds us that screening is an act of care for yourself and those who depend on you.

Memorial Hospital's teams are ready to help, from scheduling a 3D mammogram to providing coordinated oncology and infusion care delivered with expertise and compassion.

Memorial Hospital Earns ISHMPR Merit Award for Community Outreach



MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Memorial Hospital in Chester has earned the Merit Award in the Community Outreach category at the Illinois Society of Healthcare Marketing and Public Relations Fall Conference, held September 17 in Geneva, IL. The Merit Award represents the second highest honor in its category and recognizes the hospital's innovative campaign introducing the new Cardiac & Pulmonary Rehab Center to area residents. Mariah Bargman, Marketing and Community Relations Manager at Memorial, joined peers from across the state to accept the accolade and celebrate the team's dedication to patient education and community engagement.

The award-winning campaign launched in June 2024, shortly after the center opened its doors in May. Faced with rising rates of respiratory and cardiac diagnoses, Memorial Hospital set out to bridge gaps in post-hospital care by bringing specialized rehabilitation services closer to home. The marketing initiative wove together warm photography of familiar faces, educational videos featuring Dr. John Groll, Cardiologist and Specialty Clinic physician at Memorial, along with print and digital materials designed to explain the recovery process and encourage referrals from providers.

Throughout the year, the hospital's Marketing Department and Cardiac & Pulmonary Rehab Center leveraged a multi-channel awareness campaign that included trusted voices and visual storytelling. The materials underscored Memorial Hospital's commitment to long-term wellness and health equity, ensuring that patients and families felt both

informed and supported from diagnosis through recovery.

By the end of its first year, the Cardiac & Pulmonary Rehab Center had served 22 patients, 18 completing the cardiac rehab program, two completing pulmonary rehab, and two receiving outpatient respiratory services. To sustain patient engagement beyond the campaign's launch, the Rehab Center has introduced monthly support sessions for program graduates and the public with their "Beat, Breathe, Thrive" meetings held the fourth Tuesday of every month. Staff have provided educational talks at senior centers and continue to reach out to the community at in-person events.

"Winning the ISHMPR Merit Award affirms our belief that heartfelt storytelling and community trust are vital in healthcare outreach," said Brett Bollmann, CEO



at Memorial Hospital. "Our Cardiac & Pulmonary Rehab Center campaign was built on empathy, clarity, and local connections. We're honored to be recognized and remain steadfast in our mission to help every patient heal and thrive close to home."

The Cardiac & Pulmonary Rehab Center offers personalized exercise programs, nutritional guidance, risk-factor education, and ongoing support for individuals recovering from heart surgeries, heart attacks, chronic respiratory conditions, and other cardiopulmonary events. On October 1, 2025, Memorial Hospital in Chester, hosted a comprehensive Emergency Decontamination Training session, welcoming both its own Decontamination team and three members from Sparta Community Hospital's Decon team. Led by Scott Klosterman of BJC Emergency Management Agency (EMA), the training provided critical education and hands-on experience to enhance regional readiness for hazardous exposure incidents.

Participants engaged in classroom instruction focused on identifying and responding to chemical, biological, liquid, and radiological threats. The curriculum emphasized proper protocols for decontaminating patients exposed to hazardous materials, ensuring staff are equipped with the knowledge and confidence to act swiftly and safely in real-world scenarios.

A key component of the training involved mastering the use of specialized protective suits, including correct procedures for donning and doffing. Staff also practiced patient decontamination techniques using Memorial Hospital's decontamination tent and equipment, gaining valuable experience in a controlled, realistic setting.

The immersive, hands-on nature of the training was well received by attendees, who appreciated the opportunity to refine their skills and collaborate across institutions. Memorial and Sparta Community Hospital remain committed to fostering preparedness and community resilience through ongoing education and inter-hospital partnerships.
