Memorial Hospital Receives 5-Star Patient Rating



The National Rural Rating System is proud to announce that Memorial Hospital of Chester, IL is a 5-Star patient rated hospital. The new program celebrates the extraordinary patient experiences provided by rural and critical access hospitals across the United States. The National Rural Ratings System was created in collaboration with the Illinois Critical Access Hospital Network (ICAHN) to recognize rural critical access hospitals who receive exceptional patient feedback through Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Hospital Consumer Assessment of Healthcare Providers and Systems (HCAHPS) surveys. These are national standardized, publicly reported surveys of patients' perspectives of hospital care.

"Earning a 5-star reward from the NRRS is a significant accomplishment, and it is a testament to the hard work and dedication of their entire team," said Brian Lee, Founding Partner of NRRS. "We are proud to recognize Memorial Hospital for their excellence in patient care, community engagement, and innovation."

The 5-Star Rating System ranks rural and critical access hospitals — with five stars being the top ranking and one star being the lowest. The Star Ratings are like the CMS Stars, which allow hospitals/clinics to promote their success and are used as high-quality

recognitions. Most small and rural hospitals (60%) do not qualify because of low number of qualifying inpatients for the CMS Rankings, but are held to the same high patient satisfaction criteria. The rankings include overnight hospital stays (HCAHPS) and are based on data collected by certified CMS patient satisfaction vendors.

Upon receiving the notification of the ranking, Brett Bollmann, CEO of Memorial had this to share,

My late grandmother, Ms. Anne E. Larkins, was an accomplished elementary school principal and teacher when she was diagnosed with breast cancer in the spring of 1983. In her typical solutions-focused way, she sought to understand the disease and how

best to manage it. She modeled steps a can-

cer survivor must take to live a longer, healthier life.

She took action to modify her lifestyle and behavior and was able to rely on her family and peers for emotional and care giving support. She stopped smoking, began eating more plant-based, whole foods, and continued her active lifestyle. I have fond memories of us shopping and enjoying life outdoors. I remember one occasion in 1988 when we were playing an exercise video game. Together with her best friend, Ms. Lucille, and her granddaughter, we took time to care for ourselves to nurture our health and wellness.

Wellness: A Personal Journey and a Professional Passion

Having a family health history of breast cancer on both sides of my family inspired me to pursue a career dedicated to preventing and controlling cancer. My career and my life's purpose are focused on helping girls and women create lifestyles led by healthy choices.

These lessons resonated with me throughout my life, and I am happy to apply them at home and work to be proactive and reduce my own cancer risk. At age 26, I had a breast biopsy and enlarged lymph nodes removed from the right axillary area of my breast. Between 2006 and 2016, four close (first and second degree) relatives on my mother's side of the family were diagnosed with breast cancer.

This prompted me to gather and keep records of my health history. I also talked with my health care team about getting tested for gene mutations such as BRCA. My results for BRCA 1 and 2 mutations were negative. I've learned in my work with CDC's National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program and Colorectal Cancer Control Program that screening and finding cancer early help reduce the cases of and deaths caused by cancer. As I have been inspired by my grandmother, I encourage you to learn your personal and family health history. Talk to relatives, even the shy ones. These conversations are important for helping understand your cancer risk.

I found that with my family, good food and fun activities help make the conversation easier. For example, my family loves cookouts and neighborhood block parties. Holidays and events like Thanksgiving and family reunions are also perfect opportunities to learn and share.

Essentially, cancer prevention and control is about wellness. Wellness is defined as a dynamic process of becoming aware of and making conscious choices toward a more balanced and healthy lifestyle. It is important to make wellness a part of every dimension of life—social, physical, emotional, occupational, intellectual, environmental, spiritual, and financial.



WELL-WOMEN CHECK-UPS AND SCREENINGS

Your well-woman visit is your chance to focus on your overall health and discuss it with your doctor. Your visit will include a physical exam that takes a closer look at your body and help find any signs or symptoms that could lead to larger health issues in the future. It is also important that you schedule screenings at specific ages to help check for diseases and cancers.

Be cautious of who you share your portal user name and password with, as they will also be able to see these results as soon as they are posted

"We really want to give students a look at the many healthcare related career options in our rural area and try to introduce them to a variety of professions," says, Mariah Bargman, program director. "By introducing them to as many career paths as possible, we hope they will find one that peaks their interest and helps them make a plan for their future." Each year adjustments are made to programing to incorporate new careers and expand on what Explorers learned the year prior. "Students have the opportunity to join multiple years, so ensuring the program is always fresh and exciting is important to keep them engaged," says Bargman.

As an Explorer, students are given privileges to job shadow in many departments and with specialty providers. They also get the opportunity to build connections, and network with professionals throughout healthcare. This helps further their understanding of the daily demands different healthcare work-

ers experience and help them make better decisions in a career path that may fit their abilities and interests. Explorers who are seniors in High School or attending college are able to apply for a scholarship. The scholarship application process includes extra job shadowing hours and short essays. A committee will then evaluate their performance and editorial pieces, and a \$500 scholarship is awarded by the Memorial Hospital Auxiliary.



Memorial Hospital's Emergency Response Team drills annually to assess the Command Structure process and effectiveness of communication between the command center, triage, and emergency room. This allows all employees to practice their emergency response roles. The entire scenario lasted about an hour and a half.

During the drill and in a real emergency, employees are assigned specific tasks to aid in triage and tracking of patients, and communication throughout the hospital and the command center. Many drills take

on the assumption that regular forms of communication may not be available (i.e. phone lines, internet, and even power out-



ages). The employees learn how to adapt their communication and processes while continuing to provide care to the increase of patients arriving at their facility.

One mannequin was reported as a casualty due to his injuries. The others were treated for their wounds and survived. Memorial has several new employees, "so this was a learning experience for a lot of staff and a review for many," said Georgia Stipe, Emergency Preparedness Coordinator at Memorial. We are happy to report that all staff responded quickly to the incident and played out their roles with efficiency.
